General Overview

Tax Returns

- Federal income tax returns originally due April 15th, are now due July 15th
- The extension to July 15th is automatic with no paperwork to be filed

Tax Payments

- Federal income tax payments originally due April 15th, will now be due July 15th
- There is no limit on the amount of the tax payment that may be postponed until July 15th
- 1st quarter estimated tax payments due April 15th, are also due July 15th
- 2nd quarter estimated tax payments are still due June 15th



Frequently Asked Questions

Selected FAQs from the IRS website (not exhaustive) (slide 1 of 3)

- What if I can't file my federal income tax return by July 15th?
 - If you are unable to file your federal income tax return by July 15th, you must request an extension of time to file with the extended due date being October 15th
 - To avoid penalties and interest, an estimate should be sent in with the extension request

- What are the form numbers of the specific Federal income tax returns, whose filing deadlines have been postponed from April 15th to July 15th, under this Notice?
 - Form 1040
 - Form 1041
 - Form 1120

There are other forms that have also been postponed, but these are the ones we most commonly see

- Does this relief apply to state tax liabilities?
 - No

- Does this relief provide more time to contribute money to my IRA for 2019?
 - Yes. Contributions can be made to your IRA, for 2019, through July 15th

- Does this relief provide my more time to contribute money to my HSA or Archer MSA for 2019?
 - Yes. Contributions can be made to your HSA or Archer MSA, for 2019, through July 15th



Frequently Asked Questions

Selected FAQs from the IRS website (not exhaustive) (slide 3 of 3)

- I want to file a claim for a refund for 2016 (or any other year), which must be filed by April 15th to be timely.
 Does this relief give me more time to claim my 2016 refund?
 - No

- I failed to make the required installments of estimated tax in the required amounts during 2019, for my 2019 taxable year. Does this relief apply to an estimated tax penalty for 2019?
 - No





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
